Policy Statement on Safeguarding Children, Young People and adults at risk

The Church of England is committed to the safeguarding, care and nurture of everyone within our community.

In the United Benefice of East Leake we take our safeguarding responsibilities seriously.

1. Promote a safe environment and culture.
2. Adopt and regularly review the House of Bishops' nation Safeguarding policies and practice. (Details available on the Church of England website www.churchofengland.org)
3. Safely recruit, train and support all those with any responsibility for children, young people and vulnerable adults within the church, including appropriate DBS checks.
4. Ensuring that there is appropriate insurance cover for all activities involving children and adults undertaken in the name of the parish.
5. Having a named Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) to work with the incumbent and the PCC to implement policy and procedures.
6. Display on church premises and on the parish website the details of who to contact if there are safeguarding concerns or support needs.
7. Respond promptly to every safeguarding concern and allegation.
8. Listen to and take seriously all who disclose abuse.
9. Care pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse and other affected persons.
10. Responding to and monitoring those who may pose a risk to others.
11. Caring for, whilst monitoring, those who are the subject of concerns and allegations.
12. Ensure that health and safety policy, procedures and risk assessments are in place and are reviewed annually.
